
Major Incidents

When terrible things happen like the attack on Borough Market, the fire in Grenfell Towers or the attack in Finsbury Park it creates a lot of demand in those areas for the Emergency Services.

But I want to reassure you that Hillingdon doesn't simply get forgotten. We obviously send officers as an incident unfolds and for some time afterwards. But as things settle down there are very rarely more than 7 officers redeployed away from Hillingdon. We understand everyone needs reassurance so local visibility remains important to us. What we might do is move a few resources around within Hillingdon so you see more of us where most of you tend to go.

Immediately after an incident like this we will have some officers working very long hours and witnessing things none of us would ever choose to see. But it continues to amaze me how these officers cope and continue to be the best and most motivated cops in the world. Here is just one example of many:

PC Boyden had just finished a full shift in Hillingdon when she was retained on duty and redeployed to central London to spend the night stood on one of many harrowing crime scenes in Borough Market. Once relieved the next day and on route back to Hillingdon she could be forgiven for not being fully alert. But that was not the case at all. She saw a dog loose on the A40, stopped traffic and was able to secure the terrified animal. She then took it to a local vet where its chip was checked and it was reunited with its owner. To retain that level of focus and commitment is just amazing. Well done.
